FOR SPRING TERM, 2021
NOVEMBER 2-11, 2020

We hope you are ready to register for another term at Berea. Please arrange to meet with your advisor between Monday, October 26 and Friday, October 30 to plan your schedule. You should include alternate courses in the event your preferred courses are not available at the time of registration.

COMPLETE THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURES IN THE ORDER GIVEN FOR REGISTRATION:

1. Contact your academic advisor for an appointment to plan your academic program.
2. You are expected to do preliminary planning of your schedule prior to your meeting with your advisor. Also, be prepared to discuss with your advisor your future career plans and how you are currently progressing. Please bring a copy of your degree audit (listed as Degree Evaluation) along with other relevant materials with you to the appointment with your advisor.
3. After your schedule(s) is completed, your advisor will give you an alternate PIN (which is a Personal Identification Number to use for registration only). This PIN is equivalent to the advisor's signature and indicates that the two of you have met and completed the schedule planning process. You will be asked for your Alternate Pin after you go in to the Registration screens. **Please take care not to misplace this important part of your registration information – only your advisor can give it to you again.** The Office of the Registrar will not provide a student with their PIN during the initial registration period.
4. Use your alternate PIN to begin your registration on myBerea according to the schedule below. (You will not be able to register until your scheduled time.) The Web registration screens provide instructions on how to proceed with registration.
5. Please be aware that your labor contract for fall must be completed prior to registration.

ORDER OF REGISTRATION

Registration day and time is determined by the number of credits you have earned (**does not include the credits for which you are currently enrolled**). Please check the menu on myBerea for the section "Check your Registration Status" to view your assigned time for registration. This will also give you access to see if you have any holds that would prevent your registration (Emergency Contact Information Update, Financial Aid, Student Payroll, Student Accounts). Any holds will need to be cleared through the office that placed the hold on your record before you can register.

CLOSED CLASSES, COURSE TIME CONFLICTS, PREREQUISITES

You will not be required to get the signature of your advisor if you encounter closed classes, have a course time conflict, or if you have problems with prerequisites. Instead, please contact the instructor of the course. If you are given permission to enroll in the course, that instructor will process the override and you must then register for the course by going back to the Web Registration page in myBerea.

INTERNSHIP AND INDEPENDENT STUDY

To register for any Internship, you must submit the appropriate application materials with required signatures to the Internship Office. Be sure you are aware of deadlines. The Internship Office will submit a list of the approved internships to the Office of the Registrar (116 Lincoln Hall) for registration processing.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR APPLIED MUSIC (PRIVATE LESSONS)

You will sign up for these courses in the Music Building (Presser Hall) at the beginning of the Fall and Spring terms. The Registrar will register you for these courses once the list of students is complete.

CHANGE OF PROGRAM (DROPPING/ADDING COURSES)

You will be permitted to drop-add, without fee, anytime between the time you register and the date posted on the [Spring Academic Calendar](#). After these dates, you are not permitted to add a course. To withdraw from a course, you will need to process an electronic [drop form](#) from the Registrar's Forms Page with your advisor's signature. Any course withdrawals after the date posted on the [Spring Academic Calendar](#) will be assigned a withdrawal grade (for courses that occur during Spring Session A).

POLICY REGARDING COURSES DROPPED

Courses dropped during official registration periods or the date posted on the [Spring Academic Calendar](#) will not be reflected on the permanent record. The letter "W" (withdrawn) will be used to indicate courses dropped during the time indicated to withdraw from a course with a grade of W on the academic calendar. You may withdraw from a course during the time indicated to receive a WP or WF on the academic calendar and your instructor will be asked to indicate the quality of any completed work to that point with a "WP" (withdrawn passing) or a "WF" (withdrawn failing). No course may be dropped during the final seven weeks of the term. WP/WF will not be counted in calculating the GPA. (See calendar above for official drop/withdrawal dates.)

TEACHER CERTIFICATION

Students planning to complete requirements for teacher certification must follow the guidelines given in "Program for Preparation for Teachers" in the Berea College Catalog.

COURSE FEES

Course fees, shown in the Schedule of Classes and in the current Berea College Catalog, are charged to the student's account. The fee is automatically charged upon registration for the course. The student's account is credited if the course is dropped by the end of the first week of class as indicated in the official College calendar.

SCHEDULE OF CLASS HOURS

Letters following course numbers (A, B, C, etc.) indicate sections of the same course. Letters attached to the course (i.e., 186A) indicate a specialized topic. The time of the class meeting is indicated by CLOCK hours, (e.g., 0800 is 8:00 am, 1000 for 10:00 am, 0100 for 1:00 pm). The days of class meetings are indicated as follows: M=Monday, T=Tuesday, W=Wednesday, R=Thursday, F=Friday, Saturday=ST.

CONVOCATION CREDIT

All students will automatically be enrolled in a .25 credit convocation course (CNV 100) during each of their regular terms of enrollment, with the exception of the final term of enrollment, for a maximum of eight such terms. For each term of enrollment in CNV 100, the student will earn a grade of CA (which is calculated as an A in the GPA) for attending at least seven convocations. The grade of CF (which is calculated as an F in the GPA) will be awarded for attendance at fewer than seven convocations. Enrollment in this course is optional during the final term at Berea and is prohibited if the student has already enrolled in this course eight terms.

IMPORTANT

Course Loads: The Maximum course credit load is 4.5 for all full-time students. Requests for course overloads can be made by the student by completing an [Overload Form](#) which is available on the forms page of the Registrar's webpage. Overloads will be added to the student schedule after the necessary approval signatures are collected electronically.

Underloads: For degree candidates, all class underloads (less than 3 credits) must have prior approval of the Student Admission and Academic Standing Committee. Requests for course underloads should be submitted to the Office of Academic Services (110 Lincoln Hall).

SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Students will be placed on Academic Probation at the end of any regular term for failure to maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) or meet the credits requirement identified in the Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) chart listed in the College Catalog (<http://catalog.berea.edu/Current/Catalog>).

Students who are deficient in meeting the SAP requirements may make up the deficiency during the Summer Term at Berea College or another regionally accredited institution. If credit is to be earned elsewhere, permission must be secured by completing the [Application for Transfer Credit form](#) prior to enrollment.

Spring 2021 Special Topics Course Descriptions

AFR 286 JCC – Carceral States: Race and the Struggle Against Prisons and Policing - While popular films like 13th and texts like The New Jim Crow have attempted to distill the role of race in the buildup of what Beth Ritchie calls the “Prison Nation,” this course will offer students a far deeper understanding of how race, gender, class, and sexuality all inform mass incarceration and the logics of policing and punishment. Alongside our examination of race, gender, and class criminalization, we will also study crucial touchpoints of the prison nation’s buildup and the intricacies of its enactments. Beyond attending to the impacts of the carceral state, we will also explore various resistance movements, including the Black Intellectual Prison Tradition, anti-carceral feminism, prison abolition, and queer and trans struggle against police and prison violence.

AFR 286 JC – Black Feminist Theory - This course explores contemporary and foundational Black Feminist thought. Throughout the class, we will examine several traditions of Black Feminism, discovering how each tradition intervenes into hegemonic knowledge systems, provides models of political and everyday practice, and offers new ways to analyze the world around us. We will pay special attention issues that have been particularly important to foundational and emerging Black Feminism including: labor and economy, nationalism, carcerality, the politics of sexuality, embodiment, and relationship, the politics of respectability, intersectionality and standpoint theory, reproductive justice, environmental justice, and the everyday business of survival.

AFR 386 JK – The World Turned Upside-Down: Atlantic World Revolutions - This course examines the revolutions that the spread across the Atlantic World from the mid-18th to the mid-19th century, a period some have called the “Age of Revolutions.” The primary focus is exploring the “successful” revolutions of the era: the American Revolution for independence from British rule, The French Revolution, The revolution in Saint-Domingue (the Haitian Revolution) that overthrew both French and white planter rule. Through discussion of these revolutions we will investigate ideas of freedom, unfreedom, and slavery. Colonial and anti-colonial relationships, and the transformation and transmission of ideas.

ARH 286 VE – Gods, Heroes, and Monsters in Renaissance Art - In the visual landscape of the Renaissance, gods, goddesses, heroes, and monsters from classical mythology are a ubiquitous presence. They dance across canvases, adorn the interior spaces of palaces, and frolic through books, prints, and drawings. Whether used as political symbols or as models of good (and terrible) behavior, the pagan pantheon enjoyed a special place in the imagination of artists and their patrons who lived in a society that was wholly circumscribed by a deep and abiding adherence to Christian doctrine. In this course, we will examine works of art created during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries by artists such as Botticelli, Mantegna, and Raphael, for patrons including Isabella d’Este, the Medici, and the papal court in Rome. Students will utilize visual analysis, primary sources, and secondary studies in order to reconstruct the social, political, and historical contexts of the works in question.

BUS 286 MR – Lean Practices - This course will explore the concepts behind Lean Management Practices and their application within manufacturing and service organizations in our current economic environment. The class will make extensive use of the Continuous Improvement Projects on Campus as examples of applying the theory and methods to real problems. The course will also use outside speakers to incorporate Six Sigma Greenbelt training which with the completion of an independent project can lead to Greenbelt Certification. Guest Collaborator: Mr. William Peterson University of Tennessee Knoxville.

CFS 386 CM – Infancy Intervention, Caregiving, and Curriculum - This course will examine how to provide developmentally appropriate care for children, birth through 2 years. Students will explore how to provide enriching experiences in both the home environment and the classroom setting through embedded learning within daily routines. We will examine evidence-based practices to support children and families. The course will include intervention with children and families considered to be at-risk due to biological or environmental circumstances.

COM 286 LS – Health Communication - Our individual health is influenced by our interpersonal relationships, media, public health initiatives, culture, and health care providers. At the core of these influential moments is communication. This course will help you develop a better understanding of how health communication concepts, theories, research methods, cases, and other practices are applied in addressing real-world health issues and problems. Each student will have the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of the field of health communication, learn about health communication approaches and action areas, and plan, implement, and evaluate their own health communication intervention. This intervention can be used to supplement your professional portfolio.

CSC 486 JJ – Computing Design Practicum - This course is built around students' self-designed software development projects. With guidance from faculty mentors, the students will design and fully implement a working system to solve a problem of their own choosing. Using the Agile development framework, student developers can expect to employ iterative design and prototyping, regularly report progress throughout the term, and present their system in a poster session at the end. Students will develop habits of mind and work on professional development activities to bridge out of college and into industry or advanced degrees.

CSC 386 JJ – Human-Centered Computing - Programmers can be magicians enabling computers to interact with humans in more natural, engaging, and fun ways. This course takes students through a human-centered technology design and innovation process, with a focus on the interface of interactive systems. Students will learn to identify a key problem, conduct user research, prototype technical solutions, and test the usability of their ideas. Building on existing programming skills, more advanced students will be challenged to integrate interaction features into their solutions, such as image recognition, voice interfaces, or streaming data. Interested students with complementary technical expertise (i.e. digital fabrication, digital media) who are not CS majors are welcome to apply.

CSC 186 BS – Introduction to Web Development- CSC186 Introduction to Web Development acquaints students with creative web development. Students will explore the general history and behind-the-scenes of the world-wide web. Each small group of students will propose, design, and implement a website to promote a community organization or event. Their websites will separate structure, presentation, and interaction using standards-based HTML, CSS, and JavaScript respectively. This class does not require any programming experience. It does not count for credit for students who have already taken CSC236 Data Structures.

HHP 286 MT – OPEN Taskmaster - The Online Physical Education Nexus (OPEN) Taskmaster course focuses on elementary to adult activities with a focus on the six health-related skills of fitness (agility, balance, coordination, power, speed and reaction time). Students will participate in assessments and weekly activities such as Pilates, aerobics, core workouts, line dances, and ladder drills which correlate to these skills. The Taskmaster portion encompasses the intellectual and physical dimensions of wellness by encouraging students to think creatively and laterally in game-like challenges that can be completed with common household items. Students will also develop tasks for others using common household items.

HIS 186 MP – Worlds of the Middle Ages - This course covers over a thousand years of European history, roughly 300-1500 AD, from late antiquity to the Protestant Reformation. The medieval period began in the final gasp of the Roman Empire and saw the rise of medieval courts, with their kings, queens, and knights, Gothic cathedrals, illuminated manuscripts, and cloistered nuns and monks, before ending on the eve of the Age of Exploration. While tracking the major political, economic, and cultural developments of the medieval world, this class discusses the christianization of Europe and the rise of Islam in the Middle East, feudal relationships and urbanization, monasticism and Papal power, scholasticism and heresy, as well as the everyday life of men and women in pre-industrial Europe.

HIS 186 RB – Global History Since 1450 - This class explores global history through two themes: local lives and the development of the state. We interrogate the new forms of power which sought to reshape global connections in the period from c. 1450 and explore the ways in which polities and societies in Asia, Africa and Latin America engaged with and resisted the rise of European power and produced alternatives that both deepened and challenged global engagement.

HIS 286 MP – Medieval Justice: Crime and Confession, Punishment and Penance - How did people in medieval Europe define crime? What about sin? This course explores how communities in the Middle Ages thought about and responded to deviant behavior. Students will examine intersections in religious and legal history as well as themes of honor and shame, feud and reconciliation, and look at the many forms of medieval confession in sacred and secular contexts.

HLT 286 LS – Health Communication - Our individual health is influenced by our interpersonal relationships, media, public health initiatives, culture, and health care providers. At the core of these influential moments is communication. This course will help you develop a better understanding of how health communication concepts, theories, research methods, cases, and other practices are applied in addressing real-world health issues and problems. Each student will have the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of the field of health communication, learn about health communication approaches and action areas, and plan, implement, and evaluate their own health communication intervention. This intervention can be used to supplement your professional portfolio.

PSJ 186 GF – Introduction to Latinx (SOC) – This course is an introduction to the field of Latina/o/x Studies. We will examine the history and contemporary experiences of Latinas, Latinos, and Latinx and Chicanas/os/x in the United States and critically explore the concept of Latinidad—the Spanish-language term that describes the attributes that people of Latin American descent share. In our analysis, we will review historical and contemporary texts that examine Latinas/os/x experiences to gain an intersectional understanding of Latinx identities, places, histories, migrations, and social activism. In doing so, we will employ an interdisciplinary and intersectional approach and analyze the themes of race and ethnicity; gender and sexuality; nationality and immigration status; and socioeconomic class.

PSJ 386 GF – Ethnographic Methods – This course will introduce students to ethnography as a field of study and research methodology to study cultural and social phenomena. Students will come to understand ethnography as a qualitative research methodology; practice ethnographic field methods (i.e., participant observation, field notes and other forms of documentation, interviews, oral history, etc.); understand/practice data management and analysis; and share their research. As a PSJ course, this course content and projects will focus on decolonial, feminist, activist/engaged, applied, community-based, and participatory research approaches to enhance how students are able to engage/apply social science towards social justice, peace and social transformation.. Additionally, the course will critically interrogate and explore the politics/impacts/ethics/application of academic research. This course meets the research methods requirement for the Peace and Social

Justice major (and the Women and Gender Studies major). Ethnographic Research Methods may also be of use and interest to other students in the social sciences, humanities, arts; or other academic disciplines.

REL 286 TS – Christianity in the 2/3 World: Asia, Africa, Latin America – Christianity is too often defined exclusively as a western monotheism, and even in academic study, viewed only from a Mediterranean and European western-centric perspective based on the assumption that the authentic essence of the Christian religion is that which developed in the so-called western world. This viewpoint, however, excludes significant ancient and medieval traditions of Christianity that developed and flourished globally. Our course will focus on ancient to late medieval forms of Christianity and their history in Asia, Africa, and Latin America. Together, these continents form two-thirds of the world's landmass and even today, the numerical majority of Christians worldwide. As a result, the historical origins of Christianity in these areas merit detailed study from a global historical perspective.

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SOC 286 CS – Social Class and Education - The sociological study of educational outcomes and institutions, with a particular focus on the ways social class interacts with education. The course tackles two central questions: Who gets the most favorable educational experiences, and why? A substantial component of the course involves self-reflection on one's own educational history, social class, and the link between the two.

WGS 286 JCC – Carceral States: Race and the Struggle Against Prisons and Policing - While popular films like 13th and texts like The New Jim Crow have attempted to distill the role of race in the buildup of what Beth Ritchie calls the "Prison Nation," this course will offer students a far deeper understanding of how race, gender, class, and sexuality all inform mass incarceration and the logics of policing and punishment. Alongside our examination of race, gender, and class criminalization, we will also study crucial touchpoints of the prison nation's buildup and the intricacies of its enactments. Beyond attending to the impacts of the carceral state, we will also explore various resistance

movements, including the Black Intellectual Prison Tradition, anti-carceral feminism, prison abolition, and queer and trans struggle against police and prison violence.

WGS 286 JC – Black Feminist Theory - This course explores contemporary and foundational Black Feminist thought. Throughout the class, we will examine several traditions of Black Feminism, discovering how each tradition intervenes into hegemonic knowledge systems, provides models of political and everyday practice, and offers new ways to analyze the world around us. We will pay special attention issues that have been particularly important to foundational and emerging Black Feminism including: labor and economy, nationalism, carcerality, the politics of sexuality, embodiment, and relationship, the politics of respectability, intersectionality and standpoint theory, reproductive justice, environmental justice, and the everyday business of survival.

WGS 286 MM – Gender, Sexuality, and BLM - This course will introduce students to articulations of racial blackness that destabilize binary notions of gender and sexuality. It will ask how discourses of modernity and humanism have excluded black persons from human recognitions and protections, including human markers of identity and difference like gender and sexuality. Students will ask how black lives can matter, if at all, and will further deliberate how black lives might be sexed and/or gendered—in ways that do not re/produce the heteronormative, binary model of Western metaphysical thought. The Black Lives Matter movement is hence rephrased in this class as a question for feminism about the limits of the Western metaphysical philosophy on which its claims on behalf of (white) women rest. Some of the questions we will consider include: Do black lives matter? Can life matter if it is black? How is black life gendered and/or sexed (in the second instance) if human recognition is revoked for black persons (in the first instance)?.

WGS 286 ML – Feminist & Queer Dis/Ability - This course explores discourses and experiences of identity, difference, and power from the lens of Feminist and Queer Dis/Ability Studies. Feminist and Queer Dis/Ability Studies strives to unseat our hegemonic notions of able-bodied-ness and neurotypicality. As such, this class will de-naturalize and de-pathologize disability by examining theories and literature that unsettle the ability/disability binary. It will do so by focusing on intersectional experiences of women, especially women of color, queer, trans, and gender non-conforming people who struggle with dis/abilities. We will read articles by prominent scholars in disability studies as well as more popular media like blog posts.
